




2. The Old Testament is the key


John identifies himself as a prophet (1:3) in the line of the OT prophets, speaking the word of the Lord in both judgement and promise.

278 out of 404 verses in Revelation contain references to the OT

Over 500 allusions (rather than direct quotations) to OT texts e.g 'One like a Son of Man' in 1:13 references Daniel 7:13

There are 7 OT allusions1:5-1:16 alone

Revelation has more allusions to the OT than the rest of the NT put together!

Ezekiel

25 Then there came a voice from above the vault over their heads as they stood with lowered wings. 26 Above the vault over their heads was what looked like a throne of lapis lazuli, and high above on the throne was a figure like that of a man. 27 I saw that from what appeared to be his waist up he looked like glowing metal, as if full of fire, and that from there down he looked like fire; and brilliant light surrounded him.



Symbols in Revelation

1. Where John explains the symbol we need to stick to his interpretation e.g. Lamp-stands = Churches (Rev1:20)

2. If no direct interpretation is given we need to look to the OT and the context.

'Come, I will show you the punishment of the great prostitute, who sits by many waters. 2 With her the kings of the earth committed adultery, and the inhabitants of the earth were intoxicated with the wine of her adulteries.' Revelation 17:1-2



Symbols: Numbers in Revelation 1. Four, Seven, Ten, Twelve and their multiples appear all over the place! 2. These numbers point to the completeness or universal nature of something Based on: the completeness of Creation (4 rivers) OT examples: 4 points of compass/4 corners the earth/4 winds Based on: the completeness of Creation (7days) OT examples: Sevenfold anger of God, Seven lamps in Tabernacle Based on: the 10 commandments OT examples: heavenly temple in Ezekiel measurements Based on: 12 tribes

2 OT examples: numbers of priests and musicians (24,288 etc) in 1 Chronicles

Symbols: Numbers in Revelation

Names of God appear in patterns of 4 and 7

Christ - 7 times

Jesus, Spirit - 14 times

The Lamb - 28 times

The key parts of the book are the sevens churches/lampstands, bowls, seals, trumpets

Symbols, Prophets and Parables

Why use all these symbols?

They function like parables in the gospels and OT:

'The prophets used parables in Israel...indicating that judgment was coming on the anaesthetised majority, though a remnant would shocked out of the spiritual malaise' G.K Beale

'He who has an ear, let him hear' - in each of the letters to seven churches

- equivalents used by Isaiah, Ezekiel and Jesus following parables.

Outline of Revelation

From the death and resurrection of Jesus to His return will be an incredibly challenging time for His followers but they should persevere with hope and confidence in the face of those challenges.

Revelation reminds us that God is the supreme King with power and authority over all creation, both physical and spiritual, and He will prevail, Jesus will return, and His church will be lifted up to spend eternity with him in fulfilment of all His promises.
